MESSAGE FROM THE REV. CHRIS ROUSSELL, RECTOR

Dear Saints of St. John's,

This year marks my fifth Christmas with you as your Rector. During this past year, I've had a personal goal that I've kept to myself. I have been intentionally focused on being joyful and spreading joy. And what is "joy"?



Joy is different than happiness. Happiness is fleeting and temporary. Joy is longer lasting and more deeply embedded in our souls. Happiness comes from external experiences. Joy is an

(The new heaven here being the cosmos, not the eternal realm where God dwells).



ASSOCIATE RECTOR'S MESSAGE

Christmastide BY BY THE REV. BENJAMIN COWGILL, ASSOCIATE RECTOR FOR FORMATION



Siblings in Christ,

I want to write about the season of Christmastide. The song "the twelve days of Christmas" has it right—there are twelve days of the Christmas season every single year—December 25-January 5. Included in

these days are several feasts: St. Stephen (December 26), St. John the Evangelist (December 26), Holy Innocents (December 28), The Feast of the Holy Name (January 1) and one or two Sundays (every Sunday is a feast of our Lord) after Christmas, depending on what day of the week Christmas falls.

St. Stephen's is the first Martyr; or the first person to die for the faith. Stephen's full story is told in Acts 6-7; he was one of the first deacons, gave a speech before the high council of Jerusalem, and was killed for his faith and his testimony. As he died, he prayed for the forgiveness of his executors, just as Jesus does from the cross (Luke 23:34).

St. John the Evangelist is the namesake of our parish. It celebrates the beloved disciple, the author of the fourth gospel, and the only one of the apostles who church history holds not to have been a martyr. His prologue to the Gospel is read every third year in Christmastime and reminds us of the "Word made Flesh" (John 1:1-15). John's witness connects us theologically from the Bible to the development of the early church.

The Feast of the Holy Innocents remembers those children slaughtered by King Herod (Matthew 2:16-18). When King Herod realizes the wise men will not bring him Jesus, he reacts with rage and ordered all children who could be Jesus to be put to death to protect his own throne from this King. This feast is especially heavy when we consider modern children who are slaughtered by rulers in both wars and exploited in peacetime as well.

The funny thing about these three feasts is that they are moveable—they move around if the first Sunday after Christmas falls in the middle. This is not true of the Feast of the Holy Name. What this reflects is that these feasts were designated before Christmas was placed on December 25th; more importance is given to the season of Christmas than the Sanctoral (saints) calendar that is overlaid on top of it. These three feast days connect us to different aspects of the Christmas story yet stand distinct from it. They temper our joy in a Savior with the true cost of discipleship, responsibility of evangelism, and the reality that sin still affects the world at the expense of the most vulnerable.

I encourage you, as you rest and recover from Christmastide, to read the three collects for the feasts on their feast day (Book of Common Prayer, p. 237-238), and to remember especially those most in need of God's mercy.

Financial Update BY GENE KIDD, TREASURER

November pledge and non-pledge receipts fell below the levels of the last few months, but year-to-date total revenue remained above budget.

Total YTD expenses were \$33,997 above budget. Increased staff, property, and utility expenses were the main causes of the budget overrun.

YTD receipts more than offset the expense overruns resulting in a positive YTD Net of \$12,715 which was \$30,111 above budget.



ST. JOHN'S EMERGENCY GUIDE


Early in December, copies St. John's Take time to familiarize yourself with Emergency Guide for St. John's were the Guide. Every emergency tab is installed throughout the church. The important, but the first one, "IN ALL guide follows FEMA's "Guide for CASES", applies broadly to everyone. Developing High-Quality Emergency Operations Plans for Houses of Worship". To compile the guide, every employee and many group leaders were interviewed about their safety concerns. Input from both the Lynchburg Police and Fire Departments was collected and research of other law enforcement agencies and safety organizations was The guide provides instructions and included.

- Do as much as you safely can to resolve an emergency.
- Call 911 as soon as you feel you need help.
- Take care of each other. Move everyone out of harm's way.
- Notify others in the church of the emergency.
